2SSB 5093 (final passage)—Providing health insurance for children in families at or below 250% of the federal poverty level. Effective January 2009, eligibility is expanded to 300% subject to appropriation. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 68-28, Mar. 6)

2 SHB 1244 (final passage)—The workers' compensation "hour bank" bill, restoring the value of health benefits when calculating workers' comp benefits. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 64-32, Mar. 6)

HB 2079 (final passage)—Clarifying the **agency-fee rules** by establishing that these fees are not considered used for political purposes when sufficient funds exist in the union's general treasury to cover the expenditure. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 55-42, Mar. 9)

4 ESHB 2111 (final passage)—Granting collective bargaining rights to adult family home providers, small business owners who offer residential assisted living for elderly and disabled adults. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 80-16, Mar. 14)

5ESSB 5373 (final passage)—**Reducing unemployment insurance fraud** and socialized costs, and closing the "Professional Employee Organizations loophole" by requiring their clients to maintain their own experience ratings. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 64-30, Apr. 6)

CESB 5675 (final passage)—Increasing minimum benefits paid to injured workers to the same standard that is used in the Unemployment Insurance system, 15% of the state's average monthly wage but no greater than 100% of the injured workers' wages. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 68-29, Apr. 6)

7SSB 5676 (final passage)—Disallows employers from forcing workers to take their sick leave when they're "**kept on salary**" **for workers' compensation** purposes. "Kept on salary" status allows employers a premium break since no time-loss payments are recorded, and therefore the employer should pay the worker's full salary not some portion of it. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 69-29, Apr. 10)

E2SSB 5659 (final passage)—Establishing a paid **Family Leave Insurance** program for all Washington workers with the birth or adoption of a child. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 61-36, Apr. 13)

9E2SSB 5659 (Walsh amendment)—An amendment by Rep. Walsh to **exempt employers with 50 or fewer workers** from coverage under the Family Leave Insurance program. "Right" vote: NO. (Failed 44-54, Apr. 20)

SHB 1128 (final passage)— **Operating budget** for 2007-09 that fully funded state employee contracts and adding Basic Health Plan slots. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 31-17, Apr. 22)

SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

2SSB 5093 (final passage)—Providing health insurance for children in families at or below 250% of the federal poverty level. Effective January 2009, eligibility is expanded to 300% subject to appropriation. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 38-9, Feb. 14)

2ESB 5675 (final passage)—Increasing minimum benefits paid to injured workers to the same standard used in the Unemployment Insurance system, 15% of the state's average monthly wage but no greater than 100% of wages at injury. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 37-8, Mar. 10)

3SSB 5676 (final passage)—Stops employers from forcing workers to take sick leave when they are "kept on salary" for purposes of workers' compensation. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 31-15, Mar. 10)

4 ESSB 5373 (final passage)—Reducing unemployment insurance fraud and socialized costs, and closing the "Professional Employee Organizations loophole" by requiring their clients to maintain their own experience ratings. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 36-11, Mar. 12)

5E2SSB 5659 (final passage)—Establishing **Family and Medical Leave Insurance**. (The vote counted was for the original Senate bill that included coverage for family members' health emergencies and the funding source.) "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 32-17, Mar. 12)

6 SHB 1244 (final passage)—The **workers' compensation "hour bank"** bill, restoring the value of health benefits when calculating workers' comp benefits. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 47-0, Apr. 4)

7 ESHB 2111 (final passage)—Collective bargaining rights for adult family home providers. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 32-17, Apr. 10)

HB 2079 (final passage)—Clarifying the **agency-fee rules** by establishing that these fees are not considered used for political purposes when sufficient funds exist in the union's general treasury to cover the expenditure. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 29-20, Apr. 13)

9SHB 1128 (final passage)—**Operating budget** for 2007-09. "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 31-17, Apr. 22)

10 E2SSB 5659 (final passage)—Family Leave Insurance (as amended by House.) "Right" vote: YES. (Passed 26-21, Apr. 22)
